Subject: Extraordinary Year of Mercy

My dear Brothers and Sisters,

This past December 8th, on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Patroness of our Nation, we began the Year of Mercy as our Holy Father, Pope Francis has asked us to do. This year will be a year full of opportunities and blessings as we observe this year together. Our Holy Father has chosen the motto "Merciful Like the Father" for this year, that will conclude on November 20, 2016, the Feast of Christ the King.

This past Sunday, December 13th, I opened and blessed the Holy Door of Mercy at our San Carlos Cathedral in Monterey, to signify the opening of this historic Year of Mercy, a true grace of God. I have chosen three (3) sites as the holy sites for the Year of Mercy in our Diocese of Monterey, to enable you to enter through these Holy Doors of Mercy. The sites are as follows:

<u>San Carlos Cathedral</u>
 500 Church Street, Monterey, CA 93940
 <u>Madonna del Sasso Pro Cathedral</u>

320 E. Laurel Drive, Salinas, CA 93906

3. Old Mission Church Pro Cathedral

751 Palm Street, San Luis Obispo, CA 93401

At all of these three (3) sites you may receive an Indulgence granted by our Holy Father, Pope Francis by visiting and praying in the church. And thus I direct you to the words of our Holy Father, Pope Francis regarding the requirements to receive an Indulgence during this Year of Mercy:

My thought first of all goes to all the faithful who, whether in individual Dioceses or as pilgrims to Rome, will experience the grace of the Jubilee. I wish that the Jubilee Indulgence may reach each one as a genuine experience of God's mercy, which comes to meet each person in the Face of the Father who welcomes and forgives, forgetting completely the sin committed. To experience and obtain the Indulgence, the faithful are called to make a brief pilgrimage to the Holy Door, open in every Cathedral or in the churches designated by the Diocesan Bishop, and in the four Papal Basilicas in Rome, as a sign of the deep desire for true conversion. Likewise, I dispose that the Indulgence may be obtained



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in the Shrines in which the Door of Mercy is open and in the churches which traditionally are identified as Jubilee Churches. It is important that this moment be linked, first and foremost, to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and to the celebration of the Holy Eucharist with a reflection on mercy. It will be necessary to accompany these celebrations with the profession of faith and with prayer for me and for the intentions that I bear in my heart for the good of the Church and of the entire world.

Additionally, I am thinking of those for whom, for various reasons, it will be impossible to enter the Holy Door, particularly the sick and people who are elderly and alone, often confined to the home. For them it will be of great help to live their sickness and suffering as an experience of closeness to the Lord who in the mystery of his Passion, death and Resurrection indicates the royal road which gives meaning to pain and loneliness. Living with faith and joyful hope this moment of trial, receiving communion or attending Holy Mass and community prayer, even through the various means of communication, will be for them the means of obtaining the Jubilee Indulgence.

I will also be gathering a committee of several persons to help us to plan some liturgical and spiritual celebrations in our parishes and institutions for this Holy Year. Additionally, I am encouraging all of you, our faithful People of God, to observe the Year of Mercy by living out the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy, which are based on our scriptures. The Works of Mercy are as follows:

Seven Corporal Works of Mercy

- 1. to feed the hungry
- 2. to give drink to the thirsty
- 3. to clothe the naked
- 4. to shelter the homeless
- 5. to visit the sick
- 6. to visit the imprisoned
- 7. to bury the dead

Seven Spiritual Works of Mercy

- 1. to counsel the doubtful
- 2. to instruct the ignorant
- 3. to admonish sinners
- 4. to comfort the afflicted

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- 5. to forgive offenses
- 6. to bear wrongs patiently
- 7. to pray for the living and the dead

As our Holy Father has urged us in his many writings, we are challenged to reach out to others to serve and minister to them and to bring them and ourselves closer to Christ.

I also invite and urge you to take the opportunity to celebrate and to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Possibly it has been a long time since you last celebrated this Sacrament. However, it is a great opportunity to feel the forgiveness, mercy and love of God our Father, as did the Prodigal Son, Mary Magdalene and so many others in our Church history. Our priests are ready to listen to you, to pray with you and to seek God's loving mercy and forgiveness for you.

Many of our Diocesan groups and communities will also find ways to experience and to celebrate this Year of Mercy. We can truly trust that God is open to us, listens to our needs and loves us as God's beloved. Pope Francis has sent us all a message about the journey or pilgrimage for this Holy Year of Mercy:

The practice of <u>pilgrimage</u> has a special place in the Holy Year, because it represents the journey each of us makes in this life. Life itself is a pilgrimage, and the human being is a <u>viator</u>, a pilgrim travelling along the road, making his way to the desired destination. Similarly, to reach the Holy Door in Rome or in any other place in the world, everyone, each according to his or her ability, will have to make a pilgrimage. This will be a sign that mercy is also a goal to reach and requires dedication and sacrifice. May pilgrimage be an impetus to conversion: by crossing the threshold of the Holy Door, we will find the strength to embrace God's mercy and dedicate ourselves to being merciful with others as the Father has been with us.

Leap with Joy


O Lord of Hosts, you care for your Chosen People like a Shepherd who cares for his flock. Your love for us is so great that through the Incarnation of your Son, Jesus. you saved us from sin and death, so that we might have a share in the heavenly Kingdom. Through the power of your Holy Spirit, grant us fervor to do your will and, like Mary, humbly receive your love and grace. May this grace and the joy of Advent fill us and move us to bless your wonderful deeds. As we prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth, and await his glorious return, open our hearts to receive your Eternal Word, and like John the Baptist, may we leap with joy in your presence. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Sunday, December 20, 2015 Listen

Today's Readings: Micah 5:1–4a; Psalm 80:2–3, 15–16, 18–19; Hebrews 10:5–10; Luke 1:39–45. The readings for today help us reflect on the Incarnation while providing insight into God's plan for salvation. A key theme this week is obedience, a word that comes from the Latin *oboedio* (to listen to). We learn in the Second Reading that Jesus' coming into the world completes the old sacrificial system. From the beginning, he was obedient to God's plan and offered himself as sacrifice. By doing his Father's will, Jesus sanctifies us, freeing us from death.

The obedience of Mary and Elizabeth stemmed from their faith. Both offered their bodies in cooperation with God's desire for salvation. Their offering teaches us that discipleship requires surrender and trust. Today, many hear the word *obedience* in a negative light. Take some time this week to think about the ways you listen to the Word of God and act on it. In Baptism, you were given the gift of the Holy Spirit, and in our daily activities, Christ is made present in our families, parishes, and communities. Because Christ is alive within us, we, like Mary and Elizabeth, participate in God's plan of salvation. We need to be vulnerable to God's will and listen to where we are called to be a loving presence.

As we approach Christmas, consider how "the child leaped in [Elizabeth's] womb" at the presence of Jesus. When have you leaped with joy at Christ's presence?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, December 21, 2015 O Radiant Dawn

As the Nativity draws near, the tone of our final week of Advent is filled with increasing joy. Once again, we hear the story of the Visitation and of the unborn John the Baptist leaping for joy in the presence of our Lord. The First Reading lets us know that winter is past and Christ, the beloved, is near. I invite you to place yourself in the First Reading and imagine your response to Christ. *Today's Readings*: Song of Songs 2:8–14 or Zephaniah 3:14–18a; Psalm 33:2–3, 11–12, 20–21; Luke 1:39–45.

Tuesday, December 22, 2015 O King of All Nations

Today we encounter Hannah, the mother of Samuel, and Mary, the mother of Jesus. These women sing the praises of God at the birth of their children. Listen carefully to the Responsorial Psalm today and notice its connection to the Magnificat in the Gospel reading. Both texts praise God's power to cast the rich aside and raise up the poor. Jesus, the King of All Nations, has conquered the enemy, so let us rejoice. Today, you may want to meditate on the rich imagery presented in the Gospel. *Today's Readings*: 1 Samuel 1:24–28; 1 Samuel 2:1, 4–5, 6–7, 8abcd; Luke 1:46–56.

Wednesday, December 23, 2015 O Emmanuel

In the First Reading, the prophet Malachi announces a messenger who will prepare the way for God's coming. The Gospel tells of the birth of John the Baptist, the one whose call to repent and prepare a way for the Lord began our Advent season. Have you listened to John's plea? Try to review your Advent journey tonight and be attentive to the rough ways in your life that still need to be straightened. Praise God for the good works already accomplished. *Today's Readings*: Malachi 3:1–4, 23–24; Psalm 25:4–5ab, 8–9, 10 and 14; Luke 1:57–66.



Thursday, December 24, 2015 Benedictus

On this final day of Advent, we hear Zechariah's response to John's birth. His canticle is sung every day at Morning Prayer. It blesses God for setting his people free. God has kept his promise and remembered his covenant. We are heirs to this promise, so let us sing of the Lord's goodness! Today is a perfect day to finalize your Christmas preparations by trimming the tree and putting up the crèche. *Today's Readings*: 2 Samuel 7:1–5, 8b–12, 14a, 16; Psalm 89:2–3, 4–5, 27 and 29; Luke 1:67–79.

Friday, December 25, 2015 Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord

Today, with great joy in our hearts, we celebrate the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ! The Word of God has scattered the darkness; Jesus comes to set us free. All creation sings with joy, for God has been faithful to his promises. Because of the Incarnation, we are able to encounter Christ in the flesh and human life is changed forever. Today, try to take some quiet time to consider the season, and to ponder all of God's gifts to you in your heart. How can you use these gifts to help others and to proclaim the Gospel of the Kingdom of God? *Today's Readings*: (Mass during the Day): Isaiah 52:7–10; Psalm 98:1, 2–3, 3–4, 5–6; Hebrews 1:1–6; John 1:1–18 or 1:1–5, 9–14.

Saturday, December 26, 2015 Feast of St. Stephen, the First Martyr

Stephen, the first martyr, teaches us that following Christ isn't easy. In the Gospel, Jesus warns the Church of the persecutions it will endure. As we celebrate the Incarnation, we need to reflect on our baptismal promise to faithfully follow Jesus even when it is difficult. Consider singing or reading the song "Good King Wenceslaus" today and reflecting on the text. *Today's Readings*: Acts 6:8–10; 7:54–59; Psalm 31:3cd–4, 6 and 8ab, 16bc and 17; Matthew 10:17–22.
