As we look at the possibility of another wet winter and spring, we are reminded as we cover the pews with tarps just before each rain that the roof on the church NEEDS to be replaced.


This cannot be a 'one person' effort. Together we CAN cover the cost of the roof. We can make it so our parish stays "TARPS OFF!"

Donations given for the Tarps Off Capital Campaign cannot be shared with other funds at the parish. That is why your continued donation to the weekly collection is so important. Donations to the Tarps Off Capital Campaign must be made in addition to the regular donation you may give our parish.

We humbly ask you to pray about what you and your family may be able to contribute to our Capital Campaign this year when all donations for the roof go directly to the roof replacement. Will you be able to send us into that highest heavenly realm with a large donation? Could you offer something in the medium tier? Did you know that 10% of an income is the classic choice for charitable donations per year by individuals and families?

Did you know that the average American, according to a quick internet search, gives 2%—11% of their income to charity each year?

According to the IRS, in most cases, the amount of charitable cash contributions taxpayers can deduct on Schedule A as an itemized deduction is limited to a percentage (usually 60 percent) of the taxpayer's adjusted gross income (AGI). This means some people give 60%!

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton is a church and is a 501(c)(3) which as a charitable donation allows you to deduct your contribution to the **TARPS OFF!** Capital Campaign on your taxes.

Besides monetary donations and prayers, we can also accept stocks and bonds as donation. Throughout 2024 our parish will have Dinner & Dance, Live Auctions, Ballroom Dance, Kermes, and other events to help us meet our goal aside from the direct donations we receive from benefactors like you. #### A Christmas Message: The Light that brings Joy! December 2023

Dear priests and deacons, religious and lay faithful:

The Christmas readings for Mass during the Night are charged with powerful words that reflect both our often challenging lives, as well as the hope the Lord promises us.

In Isaiah we hear of a people that "walks in darkness." Have we not seen and experienced such? Each day on TV we see the darkness of violence in the Middle East, the on-going war in Ukraine and conflicts around the world. The consequent pain and trauma of children and families breaks our hearts, and we feel helpless. The continued racial and cultural intolerance in our own country which we experience is incomprehensible. Do we and our neighbors and friends, not also experience the trauma of great and unexpected losses from death, as well as economic losses, relational losses, yes, and even the losses of our own failures? Such darkness can weigh us down and even cloud our perspectives.

In this darkness of our sometimes sad experiences, the proclamation of Christmas Night boldly reminds us that a Light has shone! Indeed, this Light brings abundant joy and great rejoicing.

And where do we find that Light that brings Joy? It is in the child Jesus! In and through Jesus of Bethlehem we see the true humility and great love of God poured out. He wants us to embrace this Light and share this Joy. Jesus has come not only once, so long ago. Jesus comes still today — in one another, in the poor, in the bread of Word and Sacrament. Let us not miss his visitation for he comes in unexpected places... the lonely, aging neighbor, the parent with Alzheimer's, the struggling teenager. Let us ask him... no, let us beg him for that Joy, and the grace to embrace it, and to live in the Light. And in so doing, we "push back" the darkness. May the Light that brings Joy shine in our hearts this Christmas and help transform our dark world!

Queridos sacerdotes y diáconos, religiosos y fieles laicos:

Las lecturas de Navidad para la Misa de la Noche están repletas de palabras poderosas que reflejan nuestras vidas a menudo desafiantes así como la esperanza que el Señor nos promete.

En Isaías escuchamos acerca de un pueblo que "caminaba en tinieblas". ¿No hemos visto y experimentado algo así? Cada día en la televisión vemos la oscuridad de la violencia en Medio Oriente, la guerra en Ucrania y otros conflictos en todo el mundo. El consiguiente dolor y trauma de niños y familias rompen nuestros corazones y nos sentimos impotentes ante estas situaciones. La continua intolerancia racial y cultural en nuestro propio país que experimentamos es incomprensible. ¿No hemos experimentado nosotros, así como nuestros vecinos y amigos, el trauma de grandes e inesperadas pérdidas por la muerte de un ser querido, así como pérdidas económicas, pérdidas de relaciones, e incluso las pérdidas de nuestros propios fracasos? Tal oscuridad puede abrumarnos e incluso nublar nuestras perspectivas.

En esta oscuridad de nuestras experiencias a veces tristes, la proclamación de la Noche de Navidad nos recuerda audazmente que ¡ha brillado una Luz! De hecho, esta Luz trae abundante alegría y gran regocijo.

¿Y dónde encontramos esa Luz que trae Alegría? ¡Está en el niño Jesús! En y a través de Jesús de Belén vemos la verdadera humildad y el gran amor de Dios derramado sobre todos nosotros. Él quiere que abracemos esta Luz y compartamos esta Alegría. Jesús no ha venido solo una vez hace mucho tiempo. Jesús sigue viniendo hoy, en el prójimo, en los pobres, en el pan de la Palabra y los Sacramentos. No dejemos pasar Su visita, ya que esta visita nos aparece en lugares inesperados... en el vecino solitario y envejecido, en el padre de familia con Alzheimer, en el adolescente que sufre retos y dificultades. Pidámosle... no, supliquémosle por esa Alegría y la gracia de abrazarla, y de vivir en la Luz. Al hacerlo, "rechazamos" la oscuridad. ¡Que la Luz que trae Alegría brille en nuestros corazones esta Navidad y ayude a transformar nuestro oscuro mundo!

December 25, 2023 House of Bread

Today's readings: Christmas Vigil Mass: Isaiah 62:1–5; Psalm 89:4–5, 16–17, 27, 29; Acts 13:16–17, 22–25; Matthew 1:1–25. Christmas Mass during the Night: Isaiah 9:1–6; Psalm 96:1–2, 2–3, 11–12, 13; Titus 2:11–14; Luke 2:1–14. Christmas Mass at Dawn: Isaiah 62:11–12; Psalm 97:1, 6,11–12; Titus 3:4–7; Luke 2:15–20. Christmas Mass during the Day: Isaiah 52:7–10; Psalm 98:1, 2–3, 3–4, 5–6; Hebrews 1:1–6; John 1:1–18. On the Nativity of the Lord, we prepare ourselves to hear with fresh ears the story of Mary giving birth in a stable and making a feeding trough into a bed for our Savior. The story of Jesus' birth proclaims that great things happen in the humblest of places. The name of the unremarkable town that hosted this miracle is

Bethlehem. In Hebrew, Bethlehem means "house of bread." What perfect symmetry that the One who will become our bread of life began human existence in the house of bread.

The account of the nativity also presents a marginalized group of people as the first to hear the Good News. Not only did the shepherds go "in haste" (Luke 2:16) to see the messiah, but with joy in their hearts, they proclaimed what they saw and heard. May we be open to hearing the Good News in unexpected ways and from unexpected people. With Mary, we acknowledge the "greatness of the Lord," who fills the hungry "with good things" and sends the rich "away empty" (Luke 1:47–53).

#### Christmas Readings The Incarnate Word

The lectionary designates different readings for the Masses for Christmas. Each of these readings shed light on God sending his Son into the world to be with us.

#### Christmas Vigil Mass Name Him Jesus

Names mean something. The Gospel of Matthew locates Jesus' entrance into history by recounting his ancestry, name by name, generation by generation, all the way back to Abraham, with whom God first formed the covenantal relationship with humanity. With great specificity, Matthew tells us that the name Jesus means "savior." The One who came to save his people from their sins was born at a unique moment in history with a particular place in the genealogy of humankind. Matthew tells us that the name Emmanuel means "God is with us." Jesus came through the womb of the Virgin Mary in Bethlehem two thousand years ago and dwells among us this Christmas and every moment of our lives. Let us make room in our hearts, homes, and lives for him. Readings for the Christmas Vigil Mass: Isaiah 62:1–5; Psalm 89:4–5, 16–17, 27, 29; Acts 13:16–17, 22–25; Matthew 1:1–25.

#### Christmas Mass during the Night A Savior Has Been Born

The Scriptures assigned for the midnight Mass invite us to contemplate the incarnation through the lenses of past, present, and future. The prophetic promises of Isaiah take us back to the past when the coming of Christ was foretold. St. Paul bids Titus, and all of us, to live as Christ taught us while we wait for his coming again. Luke narrates the particularities of this historical birth of Christ and the miraculous proclamation of the heavenly host to the people of Bethlehem. We are invited into the midst of this wondrous

mystery and sent forth to announce the salvation of Christ to the ends of the earth with great joy: today is born our Savior, Christ the Lord (Psalm 96:1). Readings for Christmas Mass during the Night: Isaiah 9:1–6; Psalm 96:1–2, 2–3, 11–12, 13; Titus 2:11–14; Luke 2:1–14.

#### Christmas Mass at Dawn Go Tell It

As dawn breaks, we recall the first witnesses of the incarnation and hear the succession of astonishing announcements that result. The angels announce the glorious news to the shepherds in the fields. The shepherds hasten to visit the holy family and share all the angels told them. From there, the shepherds continued to boldly witness the glorious news to all who would listen. Receiving their witness, we join in glorifying and praising God for all we have seen and heard. We ring bells, sing with exuberance, join in worship, light up our homes, fill our tables with plenty, exchange gifts, all the while witnessing this Good News with our celebrations. Readings for Christmas Mass at Dawn: Isaiah 62:11–12; Psalm 97:1, 6.11–12; Titus 3:4–7; Luke 2:15–20.

#### Christmas Mass during the Day Word Made Flesh

The Gospel of John, read at the Christmas Mass during the Day, heralds that the world was created through the Word and that the Word has entered the world. John proclaims that the work of all creation coalesced in the birth of Christ. The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. Then creation continued infused with Christ. In the story of creation and redemption, God is always moving toward us through the Word. We are summoned to turn our lives toward the Word and allow God to be manifested through us. On this holy day, we celebrate with joy that we share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity. Readings for Christmas Mass during the Day: Isaiah 52:7–10; Psalm 98:1, 2–3, 3–4, 5–6; Hebrews 1:1–6; John 1:1–18.

Lecturas del día: Misa de la vigilia: Isaías 62:1–5; Salmo 89:4–5, 16–17, 27, 29; Hechos 13:16–17, 22–25; Mateo 1:1–25. Misa de la noche: Isaías 9:1–6; Salmo 96:1–2, 2–3, 11–12, 13; Tito 2:11–14; Lucas 2:1–14. Misa de la aurora: Isaías 62:11–12; Salmo 97:1, 6,11–12; Tito 3:4–7; Lucas 2:15–20. Misa del día: Isaías 52:7–10; Salmo 98:1, 2–3, 3–4, 5–6; Hebreos 1:1–6; Juan 1:1–18. En la natividad del Señor nos preparamos a prestar oídos nuevos a la historia de María que da a luz en un establo y que convierte un pesebre en la cuna de nuestro Salvador. La historia del nacimiento de Jesús proclama que los sucesos más importantes se dan en los lugares más humildes. El pueblito donde ocurrió esto

se llama Belén. En hebreo *Belén* significa "casa del pan". ¡Qué simetría tan perfecta: el que será nuestro pan de vida empieza su existencia humana en la Casa del pan!

En el relato de la natividad también aparece un grupo de personas marginadas que son los primeros en enterarse de la Buena Nueva. Los pastores "fueron rápidamente" (Lucas 2:16) a ver al Mesías para después proclamar con el corazón dichoso lo que habían visto y escuchado. Seamos receptivos a la Buena Nueva al escucharla de modo inesperado de personas inesperadas. Con María, reconozcamos la grandeza del Señor, que "colma de bienes a los hambrientos y despide vacíos a los ricos" (Lucas 1:47–53).

#### Lecturas de Navidad El Verbo hecho humano

El leccionario estipula lecturas distintas para las misas de Navidad. Cada una de esas lecturas destacan cuando Dios envía a su Hijo al mundo para que viva con nosotros.

#### Misa de la vigilia Lo llaman Jesús

Los nombres guardan un significado. Para narrar el ingreso de Jesús en la historia humana, el evangelio de Mateo hace un recuento de los ancestros judíos que se remonta hasta Abraham, con quien Dios hizo alianza. Mateo nos cuenta que el nombre Jesús significa "salvador". El que viene a salvar a su pueblo del pecado, nació en un momento único de la historia y tiene un lugar particular en la genealogía de la humanidad. Mateo nos dice que el nombre Emmanuel significa "Dios con nosotros". Jesús salió del vientre de la Virgen María en Belén hace dos mil años y vive entre nosotros esta Navidad y en cada momento de nuestra vida. #### Misa de la noche Ha nacido el Redentor

San Pablo invita a Tito, y a todos nosotros, a vivir como nos enseñó Cristo, aguardando su segunda venida. Lucas narra las particularidades del nacimiento de Cristo y de la proclamación misteriosa del ejército celestial a los pastores de Belén. Nos llevan al meollo de este misterio maravilloso y nos envían a anunciar la salvación de Cristo a los confines

# **ESSING TO CHRIST IN THE EUCHARIST** S.E.A.S. PARISHIONERS

# JUNE 11, 2023 — JULY 17, 2024

When I think of the Eucharist, and look at my life as a priest, as a Bishop and as the Successor of Peter, I naturally recall the many times and places in which I was able to celebrate it. I remember the parish church of Niegowić, where I had my first pastoral assignment, the collegiate church of Saint Florian in Krakow, Wawel Cathedral, Saint Peter's Basilica and so many basilicas and churches in Rome and throughout the world. I have been able to celebrate Holy Mass in chapels built along mountain paths, on lakeshores and seacoasts; I have celebrated it on altars built in stadiums and in city squares... This varied scenario of celebrations of the Eucharist has given me a powerful experience of its universal and, so to speak, cosmic character. Yes, cosmic! Because even when it is celebrated on the humble altar of a country church, the Eucharist is always in some way celebrated on the altar of the world. It unites heaven and earth. It embraces and permeates all creation. The Son of God became man in order to restore all creation, in one supreme act of praise, to the One who made it from nothing. He, the Eternal High Priest who by the blood of his Cross entered the eternal sanctuary, thus gives back to the Creator and Father all creation redeemed. He does so through the priestly ministry of the Church, to the glory of the Most Holy Trinity. Truly this is the mysterium fidei which is accomplished in the Eucharist: the world which came forth from the hands of God the Creator now returns to him redeemed by Christ.

The Eucharist, as Christ's saving presence in the community of the faithful and its spiritual food, is the most precious possession which the Church can have in her journey through history. This explains the lively concern which she has always shown for the Eucharistic mystery, a concern which finds authoritative expression in the work of the Councils and the Popes. How can we not admire the doctrinal expositions of the Decrees on the Most Holy Eucharist and on the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass promulgated by the Council of Trent? For centuries those Decrees guided theology and catechesis, and they are still a dogmatic reference-point for the continual renewal and growth of God's People in faith and in love for the Eucharist. In times closer to our own, three Encyclical Letters should be mentioned: the Encyclical Mirae Caritatis of Leo XIII (28 May 1902), the Encyclical Mediator Dei of Pius XII (20 November 1947) and the Encyclical Mysterium Fidei of Paul VI (3 September 1965).
