Renewed Temples



*Today's readings: Exodus 20:1-17; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 11; 1 Corinthians 1:22-25; John 2:13-25.* Lent is a time for interior and exterior cleansing. Jesus was outraged when he saw what was taking place in the temple. The moneychangers failed to show reverence for the house of God when they used it as a marketplace. While some could not understand Jesus' overturning of the moneychangers' tables, the disciples recalled the words of Scripture, "Zeal for your house will consume me." Jesus' reaction to the sales in the temple make it apparent that such zeal was missing from others.

In baptism, we become a temple of the Holy Spirit. Our consideration of Christ's care for the temple in Jerusalem is an opportunity to reflect on how we care for all human beings, who are made in the image and likeness of

God. Do we treat them with the dignity that a child of God deserves, remembering each person is sacred?

Just as you show concern for others, you need to care for yourself. How do you care for your interior life? Do you seek reconciliation with God through the sacrament of penance? Do you take to heart that God's mercy is for you as well as for others? In the remaining weeks of Lent, be especially attentive to the words of the penitential act. During this part of the Mass, the faithful may pray the Confiteor, after which the priest calls on God's mercy. The other option is for the faithful to pray the Kyrie, saying, "Lord, have mercy / Christ have mercy" to the priest's invocations. Seeking mercy, our zeal for God is apparent.



## THIS WEEK AT HOME

### Monday, March 4 Faith and Humility

When Jesus is asked to perform signs in his hometown as he did in other places, he refuses, saying, “No prophet is accepted in his own native place.” Jesus accepted that his former neighbors would not believe and so did not seek to prove himself. Sometimes we face humbling situations; we, too, do not need to prove ourselves. It is necessary only to accept that all we have is by the grace of God. *Today’s readings: 2 Kings 5:1–15ab; Psalm 42:2–3; 43: 3–4; Luke 4:24–30.*

### Tuesday, March 5 Love and Kindness

In today’s Gospel, Jesus tells Peter that he must forgive another “not seven times but seventy-seven times.” From that instruction, we may ascertain that we are to forgive over and over again. Such forgiveness is an act of kindness, one which any of us would hope to receive after our own transgression. When wronged, we have an opportunity to create enmity or to nurture love. Who needs your forgiveness? From whom do you need to request forgiveness? *Today’s readings: Daniel 3:25, 34–43; Psalm 25:4–5ab, 6, 7bc, 8–9; Matthew 18:21–35.*

### Wednesday, March 6 Praise the Lord

“Praise the Lord, Jerusalem,” we sing today in the refrain for Psalm 147. In recognizing all that God has done, the psalm is a reminder that prayers of praise should be part of our prayer life. During these remaining weeks of Lent, schedule a time at the end of the day to recall the ways that God has blessed you. Compose your own prayer of praise and thanksgiving. You might include today’s refrain in your prayer. *Today’s readings: Deuteronomy 4:1, 5–9; Psalm 147:12–13, 15–16, 19–20; Matthew 5:17–19.*

### Thursday, March 7 Soften Your Hearts

In the reading from Jeremiah, the Lord speaks of how his people have ignored his voice and his commands. The Lord tells the prophets: “But they obeyed not, nor did they pay heed. They walked in the hardness of their hearts.” Hardened hearts are still noticed, as people are concerned with many things. Efforts can be made to soften hearts. Today, tell someone that God loves him or her, and that you do too. Do not expect a response. *Today’s readings: Jeremiah 7:23–28; Psalm 95:1–2, 6–7, 8–9; Luke 11:14–23.*

### Friday, March 8 Listen with Your Heart

Sometimes we ask questions when we already know the answer. Are we hoping for a different answer from what we know is from God? The third week of Lent is winding down. Have you committed to a process of transformation? Have you set aside time for discernment and reflection? As the Lenten season continues, take courage and listen with your heart. *Today’s readings: Hosea 14:2–10; Psalm 81:6c–8a, 8bc–9, 10–11ab, 14, 17; Mark 12:28–34.*

### Saturday, March 9 Spring Cleaning

The phrase “Practice makes perfect” is kept in mind while seeking to improve performance. In today’s readings, we hear that God desires our love and mercy, not our sacrifice. Each season of the liturgical year is a new opportunity to grow in our love for God and others and to learn to be generous with our mercy. Lent’s emphasis on penitence and baptism is an invitation to discard what keeps us from God and bring to the fore those practices that conform us to the promises of our baptism. Some might call this an interior spring cleaning. *Today’s readings: Hosea 6:1–6; Psalm 51:3–4, 18–19, 20–21ab; Luke 18:9–14.*

**Domingo, 3 de marzo de 2024**

**Templos renovados**



*Lecturas del día: Éxodo 20:1–17; Salmo 19:8, 9, 10, 11; 1 Corintios 1:22–25; Juan 2:13–25.* La Cuaresma es el tiempo para la limpieza interna y externa. Jesús se indignó ante lo que estaba sucediendo en el templo. Los cambistas no mostraron ningún respeto a la casa de Dios cuando la usaron de mercado. Si bien algunos alcanzaban a comprender por qué Jesús volteó las mesas de los cambistas, los discípulos recordaron las palabras de las Escrituras: “El celo por tu casa me devora”. La reacción de Jesús ante el mercado en el templo evidenció que ese celo estaba ausente en los demás.

En el bautismo nos convertimos en templo del Espíritu Santo. El aprecio que Cristo tiene por el templo de Jerusalén es una oportunidad para reflexionar cuánto cuidado le dispensamos al ser humano, hecho a imagen y semejanza de

Dios. ¿Lo tratamos con la dignidad con la que merece ser tratado un hijo de Dios?

Así como usted se preocupa por los demás, debe preocuparse por usted mismo. ¿Cómo cuida su vida interior? ¿Busca reconciliarse con Dios mediante el sacramento de la penitencia? ¿Se toma en serio que la misericordia de Dios es para usted y para los demás? En las semanas restantes de Cuaresma, preste atención especial a las palabras del acto penitencial. Durante esta parte de la misa, los fieles rezarán el *Confiteor* (el “yo pecador”) después de lo cual el sacerdote pide la misericordia de Dios. Aunque también podrían rezar el *Kyrie*, diciendo: “Señor, ten piedad / Cristo ten piedad” a las invocaciones del sacerdote. Mientras buscamos la misericordia de Dios, manifestamos nuestro celo por él.



## ESTA SEMANA EN CASA

### Lunes, 4 de marzo

#### Fe y humildad

A Jesús le piden realizar milagros en su pueblo natal tal como lo había hecho en otros sitios, pero se niega: “Les aseguro que ningún profeta es aceptado en su patria”. Jesús acepta que sus otrora vecinos no creyeran, de modo que no intenta probar nada. A veces enfrentamos situaciones humillantes; nosotros tampoco necesitamos demostrar nada. Basta aceptar que cuanto tenemos es por la gracia de Dios. *Lecturas del día: 2 Reyes 5:1–15ab; Salmo 42:2–3; 43: 3–4; Lucas 4:24–30.*

### Martes, 5 de marzo

#### Amor y bondad

En el evangelio de hoy, Jesús dice a Pedro que este debe perdonar al prójimo no “siete veces, sino hasta setenta veces siete”. A partir de tal precepto, podría decirse que debemos perdonar una y otra vez. Semejante perdón es un acto de bondad, el cual uno esperaría recibir tras cometer una falta. Cuando nos hacen daño, tenemos la oportunidad de crear enemistad o de sembrar amor. ¿A quién le hace falta el perdón de usted? ¿A quién tiene que pedirle perdón usted? *Lecturas del día: Daniel 3:25, 34–43; Salmo 25:4–5ab, 6, 7bc, 8–9; Mateo 18:21–35.*

### Miércoles, 6 de marzo

#### Glorifica al Señor

“Glorifica al Señor, Jerusalén”, cantamos hoy en el Salmo 147. Al reconocer las obras de Dios, el salmo nos recuerda que las oraciones de alabanza deben ser parte de nuestra vida de oración. En lo que resta de Cuaresma, haga un tiempo al final del día y recuerde las bendiciones que ha recibido de Dios. Componga su propia oración de alabanza y de agradecimiento. Sírvase de algunas palabras del salmo de hoy. *Lecturas del día: Deuteronomio 4:1, 5–9; Salmo 147:12–13, 15–16, 19–20; Mateo 5:17–19.*

### Jueves, 7 de marzo

#### Suavizar el corazón

En la lectura de Jeremías, el Señor habla de cómo su pueblo ha ignorado su voz y sus preceptos. El Señor dice a los profetas: “Pero no escucharon ni prestaron oído, seguían sus planes, la maldad de su corazón endurecido”. Los corazones se endurecen, a medida la gente está ocupada con muchas cosas. Pero puede hacerse un esfuerzo por suavizar el corazón. Diga hoy a una persona que Dios la ama, y que usted también. No espere respuesta alguna. *Lecturas del día: Jeremías 7:23–28; Salmo 95:1–2, 6–7, 8–9; Lucas 11:14–23.*

### Viernes, 8 de marzo

#### Escuchar con el corazón

En ocasiones hacemos preguntas cuya respuesta ya sabemos. ¿Esperamos que Dios nos dé una respuesta distinta a la que sabemos? Termina la tercera semana de Cuaresma. ¿Se ha comprometido usted a un proceso de transformación? ¿Ha dedicado tiempo al discernimiento y a la reflexión? Al proseguir la Cuaresma, sea valiente y escuche con el corazón. *Lecturas del día: Oseas 14:2–10; Salmo 81:6c–8a, 8bc–9, 10–11ab, 14, 17; Marcos 12:28–34.*

### Sábado, 9 de marzo

#### Limpieza de primavera

Viene a la mente la frase “La práctica hace al maestro” cuando intentamos mejorar nuestro rendimiento. En las lecturas de hoy, escuchamos que Dios quiere que amemos y que seamos compasivos, no que nos sacrifiquemos. Cada temporada del año litúrgico es una oportunidad nueva para crecer en el amor a Dios y a los demás y para ser generosamente piadosos. El énfasis de la Cuaresma en la penitencia y en el bautismo es una invitación a descartar aquello que se interpone entre Dios y nosotros y a instrumentar las prácticas conforme a las promesas del bautismo nuestro. Algunos llamarían a todo esto una limpieza interna de primavera. *Lecturas del día: Oseas 6:1–6; Salmo 51:3–4, 18–19, 20–21ab; Lucas 18:9–14.*

The release of the loan money from the Diocese has not been finalized. The Diocese of Monterey Finance Department has asked us to show with pledges that we can pay the other 50% of our loan that we have applied for.

To date the bulk of our donations have all been one-time donations with an estimated fewer than 5 signing-up for a pledge. (Online angel donors have not had enough time for pledging to be established fully, so this approximate number is from the donation envelopes.)

**FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS:**

**Q: Is S.E.A.S. a nonprofit?**

**A:** Yes! St. Elizabeth Ann Seton is a church and is a 501 (c)(3). Donations are tax deductible.

**Q: May I give a small amount now, and more later?**

**A:** Absolutely! Your direct donations are being recorded for tax purposes. Your accrued total donations determine the tier for which you will be recognized.

**FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS CONT.:**

**Q: Did the amount needed for the roof change from 2023 to 2024?**

**A:** Yes. With the 2023 rise in prices for building materials and labor, the roofing companies said this is an increased cost to us. 'Surprises' due to wood rot and other issues were NOT factored into bids; we are told to prepare.

**Q: If the parish collects more than is needed to repay the loan, where will that money go?**

**A:** Any money collected beyond the \$200,000 to repay the loan will be placed into our parish savings account for the months when annually Sunday collections, especially the summer months and holiday breaks when parishioners travel, are lean and we barely receive enough funding, and sometimes don't, for parish operations.

**Q: How much does the parish hope to keep in savings?**

**A:** It is recommended that the parish keep at least \$50,000 in savings for lean months and unexpected expenses. The more of course is better.

**Q: Could you share with us the funds that we collected last year?**

**A:** The following were published in our bulletin, website and announced at Masses last year:

\$ 28, 611 Collected as of March 20, 2023  
 \$ 19, 082 Wall Cross Fundraiser  
 \$ 20, 690 Insurance Payment (for walls)

**Q: What happened to that money collected?**

**A:** That money is still set aside for the roof replacement. The Diocese requires parishes to have half the loan amount needed before giving a parish a loan. The Diocese waived the full amount needed to acquire the loan as we have \$68, 383 (see above) and need is great.

**Q: If we add last year's roof fund (\$68, 383 ) to the current TARPS OFF donations as of 1st March 2024 (\$56, 002) How much do we have?**

**A:** \$ 124, 385. 00 YAY!!!

**Q: With that amount, can we start the work at least for the slope, flat roofs, roof top parapets, and roof drains?**

**A:** No, because that part of the construction amounts to almost \$150, 000. 00

**Q: It seems like we are doing well with the donations & creative fundraisers. We may not need a loan. What do you think?**

**A:** It depends. We still have the TARPS OFF creative fundraisers lined up:

- March 8, 15, 22—Friday Fish Fry
- March 31—Easter Sunday Kermes
- May 4—Legacy Formal Dinner and Ballroom Dance
- May 19-June 23—Cross on the Wall Fundraiser

We will see after these. We focus on these and make the most of this 2024 year because the parish keeps the full TARPS OFF amount for 2024.

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Rules or commandments are all around us. Rules help us cross streets safely. Rules act as guides such as in cooking or baking when we follow the directions to a recipe. We also use rules to identify us as belonging to a group, such as children using school uniforms which indicate to others whether they belong at a certain school or not.

In Holy Scripture the Ten Commandments are given to God's chosen people to guide, protect, and preserve them while additionally setting them, and therefore us, apart as his holy people. These Commandments were originally given to a people who had endured 400 years of slavery and were suddenly without a Pharaoh to rule them. The Israelites needed guidance as they were suddenly taken out of the familiar and led into a deeper relationship with a God they hardly knew after being inundated by the Egyptian gods for so long.

In the Gospel of John 2: 2-15, we hear of Jesus walking through the temple area seeing money changers, sellers of animals and other goods, and he made a whip and drove them out. At some point the people had started to disregard God's commandments. They were especially putting other things before God. Jesus recognized that the Jews were not living as God's holy people. They had taken money as their new god even worse, they put it first in the sacred temple. How many of the other Commandments did Jesus see being broken as he walked through the Temple area? God's holy people had lost their identity. Through his righteous anger Jesus was calling them back into relationship with the Father and each other so they could remember they, and we, are God's chosen people. Have we also stayed? Have we begun to lose our identity as God's holy people?

As far back as 2003 writers such as Peter Steinfelds wrote about Catholics not having 'common core values. The late Cardinal Joseph Bernardin from Chicago tried un-

successfully to end the polarization of liberal and conservative clergy, religious, and laity, within the American Catholic Church because it was eroding what it meant to be Catholic, or at least, it was perceived to erode what it meant to be Catholic in America.

Lent is a season of contemplation on such things. It is like being in the desert searching our hearts and letting God reconfigure them. Maybe we need Jesus to come through our heart to lash out at all the things that take away our identity as a follower of God? Perhaps instead of indifference or creating excuses for not doing what is right and just, perhaps instead of falling into sinful habits and inadvertently promoting a culture of evil because that is what surrounds us when we turn on the tv or surf the internet, perhaps Jesus is calling us instead to listen to his rule for us to live by: "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Mt 22: 37-39.

We are loved and we are all connected one to another and to our God. From the starving child in Gaza to the luxury yacht owner sailing on the Pacific to the family struggling to get by in the US, we are all children of God, created equal in his eyes. Are we following God's Commands to love one another? Do we hold Jesus at the center of our lives? Do we gaze upon his holy face when we glance at the homeless man sleeping in his car down the road? What potential action stirs our heart? Do we pray and intercede for them and others? Can we remain indifferent? Every day is an opportunity for our souls to embrace God's Commands to change our world and our hearts through action and prayer with the help of the Holy Spirit. When we die, let us have lived deliberately, identifiable as God's chosen people. God loves you. God loves me. God loves us. We love. 'cuz we love, we give.



This is the work of God, that you believe in Him. (John 6:29.)

Excerpt from THE REAL PRESENCE:

OUR Lord wants us to remember all He did for us on earth, and to honor His presence in the Most Blessed Sacrament by meditating on all the mysteries of His life.

To make the mystery of the Last Supper more vividly present to us, He was not content with giving us the Gospel narrative; He left us a living, personal reminder: His very Self, His adorable Person.

Although Our Lord is in our midst, we cannot see Him, nor can we picture to ourselves the manner of His presence in the Eucharist.

Our Eucharistic Lord, however, has frequently appeared. Why did He not permit pictures of these august apparitions to be preserved?

Ah! Our Lord is well aware that pictures would only result in drawing us away from the reality of His actual presence under the sacred veils of the Eucharist.

But if I could see, would I not have more faith? Do we not love better what we see?

Yes, the senses may confirm my wavering faith. But our risen Lord does not want our perverted senses to reach Him; He demands pure faith...

For that matter, although Our Lord is truly present in the Blessed Sacrament in body and in soul, He abides therein after the manner of spirits. Spirits cannot be analyzed or dissected; neither can they be reached with the senses.

BESIDES, why should we complain? Our Lord has arranged everything harmoniously. The Sacred Species do not touch Him, nor do they form part of Him. They are however, inseparably united to the sacramental Christ. They are, as it were, the terms of His presence. They tell us where He is. They localize Him. Our Lord could have taken a purely spiritual manner of existence; but then, how could we find Him? Where could we look for Him?

Let us thank this good Savior! He is not hidden, but only veiled. A hidden object practically does not exist for us; we do not know where it is. But we can possess a veiled object; we are sure of it even though we do not see it. Does it not already mean a great deal to us to know that our friend is at our side, that he is really there? Well, you can see where Our Lord is. Look at the Sacred Host; you are sure He is there.

OUR Lord veils Himself for our good and our advantage, to force us to study His soul, His intentions, and His virtues in Himself. If we saw Him, we would be satisfied to admire His appearance, we would have for Him only sentimental love; Our Lord wants us to love Him with a love of sacrifice. It is hard for Our Lord thus to veil Himself. He would prefer to show His divine countenance which drew so many hearts to Him in His mortal life; but He veils it for our good.

Our mind is thus forced to study the Eucharist; our faith is spurred on; we acquire a deeper understanding of Our Lord.

Instead of showing Himself to our eyes, He shows Himself to our soul. Through His own light, He notifies us of His presence in us. He is both the light and the object we must contemplate in that light; He is the object and the means of our faith...

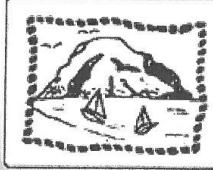
